Aim of Forum

- **Creating space for reflection and dialogue** on shrinking civic space and local impacts of geopolitical tensions.
- **Building resilience and solidarity** by mobilising support, fostering hope, and finding joy in difficult times.
- **Addressing urgent challenges**, including the US withdrawing from the 2030 Agenda, EU militarisation, the Foreign Agent Law, the global backlash on gender and LGBTIQ+ rights, and the loss of momentum for the SDGs as multilateralism weakens.
- **Shaping collective advocacy** by gathering input for civil society interventions at the UNECE RFSD on SDG3 (health), SDG5 (gender equality), SDG 8 (decent work), SDG 14 (water), SDG 17 (partnerships and means of implementation)

Background

The **ECE-RCeM Civil Society Forum 2025** takes place at a critical juncture. As geopolitical tensions escalate, democratic spaces shrink, and multilateralism comes under increasing strain, civil society faces mounting challenges in influencing global decision-making. The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are losing momentum, with financing gaps, political backlash, and the climate crisis threatening progress.

This forum serves as a **strategic space for civil society actors across the UNECE region** to come together, assess the current landscape, and strategise collective action. Through dialogue, advocacy planning, and direct engagement with UN agencies,

participants will co-develop concrete recommendations and interventions for the **UNECE Regional Forum on Sustainable Development** (RFSD). The forum will also be an opportunity to **build solidarity**, strengthen our networks, and reaffirm civil society's role in defending human rights, gender justice, climate action, and social equity in an increasingly volatile world. This is not just a space for discussion — it is a call to action.

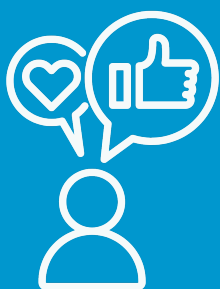
